WELCOME Jose Giocamea

We gather this evening to remember the people we have lost to HIV/AIDS over the years, give thanks for the progress we have made, and commit ourselves anew to ensuring that no one is left behind in the fight to end this epidemic.

Much has been achieved since AIDS was first identified over four decades ago. Global infection rates have begun to decline, fewer babies are being born with HIV, and millions of people are now on life-saving anti-retroviral medicines.

Guided and strengthened by hope, there is yet work to be done. More than 1.1 million Americans are currently living with HIV and many more are at risk of HIV infection.

While new HIV diagnoses have declined significantly from their peak, progress on further reducing them has stalled with an estimated 38,000 Americans being newly diagnosed each year. Without intervention nearly 400,000 more Americans will be newly diagnosed over 10 years despite the availability of tools to prevent transmissions.

There is a real risk of an HIV resurgence due to several factors, including trends in injection and other drug use; HIV-related stigma; homophobia and transphobia; lack of access to HIV prevention, testing, and treatment; and a lack of awareness that HIV remains a significant public health threat.

This evening we stand together to commit ourselves to continue working towards an end to this epidemic. We remember the beautiful lives lost over the years. We honor and celebrate all those who continue to work daily in HIV/AIDS patient care and advocacy, especially we lift up the work of Doctor David Potts and Doctor Donna Potts as they retire from this vital and important work.

Please stand as able

Tonight we reaffirm our choice to make a difference.

If we choose to act, we can bring newness, hope, and peace.

Newness, hope, and peace in our homes, in our church, in our community, in our nation, in our world...

In our bodies, our minds, our spirits

Our siblings, our family, our children, our friends are living with HIV.

Therefore we all live with HIV.

We work to remove the barriers to healing. We will undo ignorance and stigmas. We will fight for equal access.

We will show compassion and we will respond.

We will respond with our time, our energy, our resources, our love.

We will pray and act until the day the epidemic is no more.

And we trust that God will make a way for us all to be healed, blessed, reconciled and redeemed.

CANDLE LIGHTING

Third Candle
