THE ASHES OF ASH WEDNESDAY

Have you ever wondered what Ash Wednesday is all about? That name was given to this day because of the church's ancient practice of imposing ashes in the form of a cross on the forehead of the worshipers as a sign of personal absolution following public penitence.

Ashes are an extraordinarily rich symbol rooted in ancient customs and practices. In Old Testament times people often covered their heads with ashes as a sign of mourning, grief, and humiliation. Ashes have long reminded humanity of our total dependence upon God for life, for one day our earthly bodies shall become in the words of the burial service, "...earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."

Ashes also suggest cleansing and renewal. They were once used as a cleansing agent in the absence of soap, and on Ash Wednesday, the ashes have sometimes been understood as a penitential substitute for water as a sign of Baptism. Baptism is a primary emphasis of Lent. Water both stifles and refreshes, drowns and makes alive; so the ashes also tell of both death and renewal.

The first Ash Wednesday Service was held in the sixth century in Gaul. It carried over to the Roman Church and into the Lutheran Church at the time of the Reformation. Not until the turn of the 20th century did the imposition of ashes disappear from Lutheran churches. Beginning with the Lutheran/Roman Catholic dialogues in the early 1960's, Lutherans took a new look at the imposition of ashes. Many Lutheran churches have reintroduced this traditional practice. *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* makes provision for the imposition of ashes as a part of the liturgy for this day.

As disciples of Christ seeking peace and justice in the world, we welcome, affirm, and include all people into the fullness of God's love. We celebrate people of all races, cultures, ages, sexual orientations, gender identities, physical or mental abilities, socioeconomic statuses, appearances, family status, and citizenship as equally loved and valued in the eyes of God and in this place. All are invited to join this community as we worship God, grow in faith, and strive to love and serve one another. All, without exception, are welcome in this place.



GREETING AND PRAYER OF THE DAY


The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

CONFESSION OF SIN

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept for reflection and self-examination.

Most holy and merciful God,

we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.

Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.

Have mercy on us, O God.

Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.

Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

Introduction to the Imposition of ashes

At the very beginning,

God scooped up the dust of the earth and molded it into human beings,

breathing divine breath into those creatures of dust.

Over time though, we dust creatures have forgotten who we are and whose we are.

We believed a serpent in the Garden of Eden who said we could become like God.

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.

After all who desire ashes have received them, the pastor continues.

Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us all our sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen us in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep us in eternal life. **Amen.**

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

Trusting in God's promise to reconcile all things, let us pray for the church, the well-being of creation, and a world in need.

A brief silence.

Reset your Church, O God. You gather your church and call us to return to you. Accompany us throughout our Lenten journey, convicting your church to repent when we stray and strengthening us to continue the mission to which you call us. Create in us clean hearts and renew all your people to declare your praise. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God,

according to your steadfast love.

Reset your creation, O God. With the warmth of Spring we will see thorny bushes bloom with beautiful roses and once empty nests protect new life. As the world around awakens, rejuvenate and refresh your creation. Bring healing to damaged ecosystems. Fill rivers, lakes, and streams with fresh water. Create in us a renewed desire to carefully and faithfully steward your creation. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God, according to your steadfast love.

Reset the nations, O God. Bring about an unstoppable desire for peace. Raise up leaders who are willing to stand for justice even when it is the unpopular stance. Help us to find a way to end gun violence and protect the lives of others as if they are our own. Strengthen grass-roots and community-centered justice seeking organizations such as GOAL so that your people may continue being vital parts of a move toward justice and peace. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God,

according to your steadfast love.

Reset your people, O God. Give us renewed ears to finally hear those who cry out but are rarely heard. Renew our hearts where they have grown weary, trusting that you are working through us to bring about lasting change. Equip us with compassion to care for those who experience oppression, houselessness, economic hardship, and illness. We pray especially for those we name now on our lips or silently in our hearts ... Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God,

according to your steadfast love.

Reset our hearts, O God. As we are marked with ashes we remember you create us from dust. Allow us to use this imposition of ashes as a holy reset; help us to experience and live out the dying of sin and rising to life in you which we enact this day. Show us ways to more fully understand the diversity of the dust from which we are created. You create us in your image, Holy God, using gay dust, black and brown dust, female identifying dust, white male dust, differently abled dust, trans dust, and queer dust. You celebrate this diversity. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God,

according to your steadfast love.

Reset this congregation, O God. Inspire us to find new ways to live as witnesses to your inclusive love, deep mercy, and abiding grace. Continue moving in this place to make space for each of your beloved children to be their most authentic selves. Walk alongside us in our brokenness as we journey toward wholeness, helping us to bravely die and rise each day in you. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God, according to your steadfast love.

O Lord, our God, we give thanks for all your faithful ones of every time and place. Reset and renew us by the example of their lives of prayer and service, and at the last, bring us with them into your everlasting presence. Hear our prayers and have mercy on us, O God, according to your steadfast love.

We lift our prayers to you, O God, trusting in your steadfast love and your promise to renew your people, your church, and your whole creation; through Jesus Christ our Savior.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.


